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4 Reading. Read the text about the Commonwealth and check your answers in No 3.

The Commonwealth is home to 56 countries across the world. These countries are like a big family which support each other to better the lives of the people through friendship, education, peace and democracy. The three biggest countries that are part of the association are Australia, Canada and India. About 2.5 billion citizens belong to the Commonwealth; that is one third of the world's population. 60% of the people who are part of the Commonwealth are under the age of 30.



In the past, the Commonwealth countries were ruled by Britain. Today, all countries are independent but they had to fight for it. Nevertheless, many countries decided to stay close to Britain and formed the "Commonwealth of Nations".

King Charles III is head of the Commonwealth and visits the countries regularly. The King also attends the *Commonwealth Games* – a sporting event which takes place every four years. Popular sports are cricket, rugby or netball. The sporting event is also called the "friendly games" because people compete with each other and not the countries. The games help to form a bond between the countries of the Commonwealth.

On *Commonwealth Day* in March the King broadcasts a message to all members of the Commonwealth and all their flags can be seen in London.
